(I didn't catch her first clan)nishł́. Tó dích'íi'nii báshishchíín. Hónágháahnii dashicheii. Bit'ahnii dashinálí. The Bureau of Reclamation is where I work as the Navajo Outreach Coordinator. Navajo Gallup water supply project. Navajo Gallup water supply project water line at Nenahnezad Chapter area, we're going to be building it from Navajo chapter area all the way down N36. Last month they did a Navajo Blessing Ceremony, right on the side of N36 across Chaco Wash up the hill. The water line it's going to go past Gallup. The city of Gallup is going to be using this water. Along with Bread Springs, Manulieto, Crownpoint and Tse Benito. Also Eastern Navajo, they will be using the waterline. Cutter Damn that waterline all the way to Pebble Cantata. Water used and the water is running over on the Eastern side of Navajo Nation. This is the Civil engineer, Malcolm Begay. He's going to explain in English our construction updates. Malcolm Begay - My bosses are back there, Monsep - Direct Reclamation. Robert Kirk with N.N. Department of Water Resources. Micheal Blake, He's with JACOBS, doing the Water Treatment. We're in construction with two sides, the Cutter side, the green one, it's actually been going. The one we're worried about right now is the San Juan that goes to Gallup, starting from our area here. And goes out from Windowrock as well. All the ones in Blues are completed right now. Yellow, It's still under design. The red ones are in construction right now. Current projects, Pumping Plant 4 & 7. Here's what it looks like inside the plant, these are the tanks here. Going on to reach, that goes to Windowrock. We call this Pump 1 & 2, that's going to be done this month. Here are some of the pictures of that ARV, and the pumping tank we call Flattop tank. Pump Plants 2 & 3, you probably saw these a little closer, East of Table Mesa. Sanoste is

Pumping Plant 3. There's pictures of Pumping Plant 3, they're putting up some side panels and then this is when they were starting the groundwork. And then this is what's going on inside, HVAC system, the pool and motors. And then here's the pipe manifold to the pipe. The one you probably see that close to the pipeline from Table Mesa, we call that Reaches 4a and 4b. That should be done by December this year. Here are some pictures of pipes being delivered. They could be 7,000 lbs. Here are some welders working. We have a temporary pumping plant on the Kirtland side that we completed that pumping water to this reservoir called Frank Chee Willeto. The water treatment plant is being done by JACOBS. If you drive on N36 past Chaco Wash, driving and then coming up on top there's a big open area and they fenced around. As we mentioned earlier, there was a Blessing Ceremony and you all know who this one is right here, Rick Nez. (Community Giggles) Remaining projects, we got 10 for the overall project. I just want to mention a few of them that we're going to start here in the next couple of years. This one we call Reach 1 Pipeline Repairs. This is on the north side of the river in Fruitland. We purchased a line that runs from the river up to the reservoir, a 42 inch pipe and then another one that's called Pumping Plant 1 that's in the Nenahnezad area down below north of Morgan Lake. And then the last one here is the River End Gate. We're going to build a new Pumping Station there. Any questions? Herbert Cly - How many pump stations are left altogether? Malcolm Begay - There's 19 for the overall project. Herbert Cly - That's including the Pump Station that use to own PNM. For how long is this project going? Malcolm Begay - Yeah the river pump station. We'll have watered on by 2029 and so hopefully by 2030 it's working and everything is going smoothly. Becky Begay - Contractor JACOBS, Mike Blake. He's going to talk for a little while. Can you explain? Michael Blake (JACOBS Contractor) - I'm the Project Manager of JACOBS Engineering zoning and building projects. We just have a Blessing Ceremony on April 16th. It was a beautiful one. We're going to be out there building the project through 2028 and then we'll start pumping water. 2025 is going to encompass a lot of dirt work. We'll start some concrete work at the end of the year and next year will be a big focus on a lot of concrete and then we're starting to put up the buildings that handle all the process. 18.8mgd, million gallons a day is what we will produce when we are done. Ability to be upsized in the future to almost double that. A lot of what you're interested in is employment. There is employment opportunity for few trades in this project. This 2025 is not a high manpower portion of work, but there's a lot of opportunity for operators and laborers to be called upon. Towards the end of the year we'll have carpenters and concrete workers and iron workers and that opportunity will be available to the community. We will have a job outreach. We have three major subcontractors on the job, Archer Western, which is very familiar with this area and they do quite a bit of work. In fact there've been quite a few projects on this presentation. We will be setting up job fairs and online information and people would be able to apply online or at least in contact and get a hold of the right people. We're at peak time and we're probably gonna have about 350 people working on it. That will be late 2027-2028. And also going to have operators, laborers, pipe fitters, plumbers, carpenters, iron workers, a lot of different tradesmen, a lot of opportunities to encourage you once we have these websites set up. This project will be dumping a lot of money back into the community just for your tribe right after that, I think there's like \$13.2 million worth of tax. And then an additional laborer, subcontracting opportunities. Business subcontracting, vendors, supply, different people, roofers, floors, walls, electrically. George Arthur - You talk about subcontractors. Are these all these Natives or Navajos? The businesses. Michael Blake - We're still in the design phase. Were at 30%, haven't gone to market with a lot of these opportunities. And the work we are doing is the early work project, civil work along with concrete work. Haven't hired any subcontractors for this project. Becky Begay - This gentleman behind you could tell you? Could you answer his question, how many Native American contractors? Monsep - I don't have the numbers but I can get it. I know our contracts we have issued do have Native Preference. The majority of the employees are Navajo. Michael Blake - What we can tell you Sir, the workers on site are 75% Navajo. It will grow this year to an average of roughly 40 people a month. Next year 80-100. 2027, 200+ peak and 350. Probably average out 200 at close out. Robert Kirk - I work for the Navajo Nation Department of Water Resources as a Hydrologist. Tó dích'íi'nii nishíí. Naakai Dine'é báshishchíín. (couldn't get the clan) Dashicheii. Naasht'ézhí Tábaqahí (Water's Edge (Zuni)) dashinálí. 19 Pumping stations. 2 water treatment plants. Cutter Lateral coming this way was completed in Fall of 2000. All through COVID work was being done. It goes as far as Torreon and Pueblo Pintado. \$266 million, contract. April 16. Use to work with Former Council Delegate George Arthur. Randy Yazzie - I wanted to ask, how much of health and safety do you guys look at? you guys are digging trenches up here. Maybe the water truck driver was taking a break, I don't know. The equipment is picking up a lot of dirt and it goes on to the houses and everything. Is the area around where you work, is it a barricade for the safety of the animals. Malcolm Begay - We follow all the safety standards. OSHA and probably similar

areas in our own field of recreation has a more stringent, a more tougher safety protocol to follow. And each contractor we hired, they have to follow them and we also specified that they have had safety officers present. The safety officers are there to ensure this doesn't happen. Standard priority that we keep on these contractors at all times. Becky Begay - I also wanted to mention quickly a couple weeks ago Rickie Nez contacted one of our employees, Fred Limone. And one of the questions he asked was that our contractor is creating a bunch of dust and they're driving the semis right by the community members' houses. You know all that dust is going to Community members' homes and some of them may have asthma. It's over on the north side of that hill that we're working by. When you go over Chaco Watch you go up that big hill, over that hill and there's that sharp curve. We're just working on the South side of that hill over on the north side, a semi truck that's not us. Malcolm and I went out there. We were wondering who are these people that are driving out there with the semi trucks, with water trucks? What are they doing? That's none of our contractors. They're not us. And so we found out that they're building some nice roads out there towards the Chaco Wash. They told us today, one of the contractors, that they're going to be building some Helium Buildings out there. That's in the Hogback Chapter area. That's what we found out today, but that's not us. We told the contractor what we heard from you, Ricky Nez. They need to water the ground because community members are complaining about the dust and Malcolm talked to them. I'm from Shiprock, New Mexico. Táchii'nii nishít. Tó dích'íi'nii dashicheii. (couldn't make out two of the clans) Thank you for the opportunity chapter members. I serve as a tribal government relations manager with PNM and I work out of the travel government and customer engagement department out of Albuquerque. But I'm also out here at the San Juan site. We're continuing decommissioning activity over at the San Juan side across the river. I still have an office I get along with about every PNM employee. One time I did serve on a Navajo Nation Council, with former colleague Mr. George Arthur and it's interesting that the conversation also took place related to the Navajo Gallup Water Supply Project. Randy Yazzie - You said that you have support for financial aid, for schooling? Pete Atcitty - This youth development grant is made available for the Chapters to help support youth, such as in the summertime when you're not in school. Could it be educational activities, educational camp, athletic camp or individual or team? If you have the requirements, that's basically what the idea is not necessary for scholarships for schools, just for activities outside of normal school activities. Or a team needs help for an event. Randy Yazzie - What if you been going to college? Because I attend classes at Dine College. If I'm not doing anything, am I eligible? Or am I too old? Pete Atcitty - This is a Youth Development Grant depending on what the Chapter

determines youth. College Students that are 18 & 19 year olds that are making dual credit or already in college. Vice-President Sophina Tyler - Randy, there's other opportunities that the chapter provides too, funds that come from NTEC. Look into. Officials take a photo with Pete Atcitty receiving a \$3,000.00 check from PNM. H) Requesting for Community Support to initiate Ceremonial Prayer for highway N36 and collaboration with surrounding communities. Vote: Favor 17 Opposed 0 Abstained 1. 9) Reports from: Navajo Nation Code (NNC) Council Delegate Rickie Nez - I have 1 year and 8 months to go. I have enjoyed every moment of being a public servant. I'm glad it will be 18 years. I used to say hello ShiK'e doo ShiDine, then your clans. Now he is told he's supposed to say hello to the elders to the young kids. Then you're clans. My young dad George, he understands what we do as lawmakers. We can never please everybody, someone will always say negative things about us. But there's more people that pray and encourage us. As a public servant you have to think about everyone no matter what. Try to stay neutral. We had a resources and development committee, we had a grazing permittee stand in front of the committee. My cows were confiscated by resources and enforcement and she has written a letter. And the Grazing Officials had something to do with it as well. We're going to have public hearings at all 5 agencies. It sounds like she's had 7 cows confiscated, and I don't know how much a cow it's worth. But at the cowhouse it's a lot of money. If you lose 7 cows, that's a lot of lost money. As elected officials we cannot harass people and undo harassment or retaliate in any way. Whoever did the farm, got out of hand with the Hemp and Marijuana. In order to do something about it, Herbert ran and won. There was already a law in place. And the law stated that it's illegal to be involved in the industry. It has to have .02% THC, these plants that are growing you have to send it off to the laboratories to be tested. FBI, Homeland Security, San Juan County Sheriff, Farmington Police, BIA Federal Officers and Navajo Nation Officers. They brought in an assortment of equipment to remove all plants. We got the names of the people that had these farms. If they are caught doing it again, Washington DC is going to do something about it. Last month, the report was asked where is DOJ update. Where is the litigation now? It's in Washington DC with Charlie Goldbread. They were going to be updated at next Meeting, we had the U.S. Presidential Nation address. We couldn't have that on the agenda, that's what we were told. I received a text asking, Delegate Nez you said you were going to get an update on Hemp/Marijuana. Hopefully the next Naabik'iyati' will have an update on that. Happy Mother's Day! At the Navajo Nation Council Spring Session, I had 1 Legislation on the agenda, which was to appointment a new Attorney General of the Navajo Nation, Heather Claw. Was told to table this legislation till the fall session. She's a very good young lady, used to be an advisor to President Ben Shelly. Hired by NTUA as their attorney. And then I introduce legislation for her to be the Deputy Attorney General of the Navajo Nation. The first one was Ethal Branch and now her. It's not a good reflection for the Navajo Nation when we don't have an Attorney General by legislation. Summer Session Trail Ride in July from Upper Fruitland Chapter House to WindowRock. 3) Vice-President Sophina Tyler - Thank you. We appreciate you and please stay safe. Just a few little things, myself and a couple of the community members, leaders, we attended the Navajo Waters Supply Project ceremony. Other items, our audit will begin next week. We have auditors from the Phoenix area coming on site. And then our administrative assistant position that has been advertised, it was originally accepted by an applicant, but the applicant called back and had to decline. Now we're re-advertising it again. So let the community know that it is being advertised as of yesterday, I believe it's two or three weeks, and it should be on our website. PEP positions are being advertised. Our heavy equipment operator and custodian their last day was Friday. The chapter is accepting applications. We are back on track with our financial report meeting, are in compliance. We were reminded that the process needs to happen. It's a lot of work to get all this paperwork together, it takes time. With other Chapter Officials regarding our next Northern Agency Council meeting collaborating on dates. Attended a luncheon with PNM, celebrating San Juan College graduates that utilized the PNM scholarship funds. So that was something that it's an annual thing. And so I think the next go around is gonna be a huge amount of students and it's mostly Navajo from here to NTU. They collaborate together and they provide funds for our students. Secretary/Treasurer Deidra Cly-Ryals - May 8th I attended the Running Horse Pipeline Table Top and Boom deployment exercise at the Nenahnezad Chapter House. That same day it was JUST MOVE IT, here at the chapter house. I would like to thank the chapter staff for volunteering and staying until the very end till everything was cleaned up. We had about 250 people show up at our Chapter House. There are photos on the San Juan Chapter Facebook page. On May 7th I attended the CLUP-C meeting here at Chapter House. They talked about all the trash picked up.

The last trash pick up they did was twice. They picked that trash alongside of the N361. They picked up on N36. There's the DYNAMIC WALKING. They walk the perimeter of the chapter house. And if you guys don't know, there is a walking trail outside the perimeter of the chapter house, but it's maintained. So all the river rocks, they would like to go ahead and someday go in there and realign it to where it's wide enough for maybe 3 walkers, a stroller. They also talked about Rural Addressing. Elliot Jim, was coming out here to do our addressing that is actually still working. They're almost completed and are still working on the far West side of our community. That's how far they got and once we get information they're going to let the CLUP-C know. They're looking for members. So if you guys are available, come check them out. April 16th, The blessing. April 30th, we had an interview for the laborers. May 2nd, the officials had a communication meeting. B) Navajo Nation Code (NNC) Title 3: Agriculture and Livestock. 1) Farm Board Representative Herbert Cly - Use last meeting minutes and I'm going to add a little more. Gold King Mine spill that some of you want to apply; they're out of time. They were told from the beginning on how to get proof and get GPS along with the crop report. Water assessment, Operation and Maintenance, equipment is used. Upper Fruitland this coming Tuesday is having a Farm Board meeting. These LUP transfers; A permittee was wanting to transfer their permit to a relative. The relative assumed that just by being in the room their name would get added. With them assuming that they were on the actual permit they found out that the "new" permittee was NOT on the permit. He was trying to transfer the permit to another person. We had to research. The "permittee" began to argue with me. Don't do that, make sure it's transferred correctly. This issue is being investigated. Like Rick was saying it's a lot of challenge being an official. I go through it a lot. You try to talk to them nicely by following the polices and procedures. They expect you to do things under the table and quickly. You have to do all the paperwork, conservation plans and LUP transfers. Probate you refer them to get a lawyer. Farm Board meeting at Gadhi'ah next Tuesday at 8 am. And 23rd of this month, Friday, San Juan River Farm Board, we had one last month. The radio should be announcing my meetings since I left them a paper of all my meetings. Irrigation department there is no water in the canal, it goes low then high. Farmington this way to Upper Fruitland diversion, from there they are trying to clean. They use it, Navajo Nation and Farmington. Make it look like you're planting. Permittee meeting, We have a lot of potholes, probably caused by the big trucks. Home Depot has asphalt bags for \$17, patching up the potholes. My daughter got a Grant from the State of New Mexico, I don't know how far she got with that. 2) Grazing Board Representative Shirley A. Tsosie—Evening, I'm going to try to make it short. I'm glad you're still here. I try to write my report down. Jim Curley, he's a peace officer, I know he has a lot of relatives from here to Nenahnezad. What I'm saying is that I really don't know a lot of people. I really want to get to know my community. Thank you. Our last meeting was at Nenahnezad Chapter District 13 along with the permittee's, happy to see them. Thank you for being there. Our Agency meeting was at Cove Chapter last week Thursday. The next District 13 Grazing Meeting at Upper Fruitland on June 4th at 9:00 AM. Northern Agency Grazing meeting at Two Grey Hills/Toadlena Chapter, Friday, June 13 at 9:00 AM. I will be having my second permittee meeting here Thursday, May 15 at 9:00 AM. The topic is about Navajo Nation Grazing rules and regulations, we need to remind ourselves. I'd like to keep learning as much as I can. Last month I mentioned something about AIF and I want to make an apology for that. I didn't get it right, but the money AIF resolution released to RDC was just leftover money from the last programs that ended. I just want to apologize for that misinformation. Currently Red Mesa Chapter is doing a horse roundup, May 12, 13 and 14, District 9 and District 12. The Eastern Agency released a resolution for 40% livestock reduction. Northern Agency who opposed that resolution because the livestock and natural resources are different. Last month, I read this letter from the Department of AG, the Agency, Leaders, Grazing members who disagree with the letter about the June 30 deadline. District 9 & 12, they have about 100 permits and they can't do all of that and up to June 30, they're discussing that and in the meantime, we're gonna still stick by June 30. Until I hear otherwise. I started the tally count. Thank you. Please come to this permittee meeting Thursday. We can all work together. The last permittee meeting, happy with it turned out there were some people that came and I appreciate them for participating. I want to give carrots and cucumbers to eat. I'm trying to bring something like that again. I wanted to read something here, I think it's important. The letter is from the Department of Agriculture. To Navajo Grazing permittees or Navajo livestock equine owners. Mandatory livestock inventory

requirements Tally Count. Just gonna read this one that's highlighted. Livestock owners who possess a valid Grazing Permit will be allowed to graze allowable sheep units within the Range Unit or Range Management unit. Non-valid grazing permit holders will need to corral and feed livestock, seek alternative grazing areas and/or sell excessive livestock. Under Title 3 Navajo Nation Code chapter 3 subchapter 781. The owner of any livestock grazing on the Navajo Nation without a valid grazing permit will be issued a notice of violation or will be subject to action by the Navajo Nation Courts under Title 3, Navajo Nation Code subsection 710. Contact your district agent official to schedule a livestock tally count. My phone's not ringing. So whoever's got livestock, make sure my phone rings. Thank you. 10) Financial reports. Vice-President Sophina Tyler - These are listed based on the funds. We provided this to everybody. Just be aware that a lot of our financial information is posted out here right outside the door. And so you guys have questions or anything and if you just notice that there's PNM funds on this list too? We just accepted the 3000, so that will be captured there for the next month. As far as revenues go, these were the only amount that came in from this past month, \$95, I appreciate everybody being here. We see that through e-mail and our staff post it here within our area. President Angelita A. Benally–Shirley, you want to go ahead and talk about this.

Grazing Representative Shirley A. Tsosie–This resolution request Authorizing and Supporting the San Juan Chapter and the District 13 Grazing Committee Member to Implement an Indefinite Feral Horse, Stray and Unclaimed Livestock Removal Program in Efforts to Improve the Ecological Health and Productivity of the Navajo Rangelands for Present and Future Generations of the Navajo People. A) Not sure if there is one in place here at the San Juan Chapter. But this is a District Gazing Committee member copy, set in place for other chapters or grazing members to complete their official duties. This resolution is recommended by the Department of Ag and BIA Natural Resources to assist the District Grazing Community Members for unclaimed abandoned or stray livestock. By Chairman Gary Lewis. In this area we don't have a large number of wild horses like other Districts. There are wide open areas in those other Districts, in those areas they call them Horse Roundups. Here we call them Horse Pick-Up. C) This isn't only for horses, it's also for stray and unclaimed livestock This part that says Stray and Unclaimed Livestock removal, what we will be working on more in this area. What does it mean feral horse? A domesticated horse that wanders into a wild state, living and breeding independently without human care. This resolution will also prevent livestock trespassing into farms and range lands, to prevent over grazing and forage restoration, and prevent fencing/corral damages. I have received several verbal reports of live cattle along the San Juan River getting into fields and causing damages. It would be hard to catch wild cattle but it's important to have a decision of removal in place in our community. This resolution is for the San Juan Chapter and its range lands, to prevent misuse of livestock. I'm still receiving several verbal reports of horses disappearing and being moved around. Lets leave it better for the future generations.

Lavina Crosby–I have a question. I don't have a permit. I let my 5 goats out, they are pets and meat. They are outside their pens roaming around in my area. They are for my grandkids teaching them to shear. And back to the old days. Is that part of what you're talking about?

Grazing Representative Shirley A. Tsosie–You mentioned that you don't have a grazing permit. You should not be having any livestock at all on the Reservation. You are in violation.

Lavina Crosby–What are you going to do about it?

Grazing Representative Shirley A. Tsosie–I will cite you for it.

Lavina Crosby–Okay, I wanted to know. I've been having it for years and I do have tally counts from the previous Officials. He doesn't say anything like that, this is wrong and will take care of you. At the house they don't go anywhere.

Grazing Representative Shirley A. Tsosie–You have to keep them penned up.

Lavina Crosby—Yeah, I know.

Grazing Representative Shirley A. Tsosie—But when you said you let them out. You're breaking the rules. I'm not sure why they don't say that on a homesite lease it doesn't state anywhere on the homesite lease regulations that you can have a corral. But people do it anyway. That's breaking the rules too.

Lavina Crosby—For so many years I do have it and I'm going to keep continuing on. That's it Shirley, I'm not arguing with you. I just wanted to know.

A. Navajo Nation Code (NNC) Title 2: Navajo Nation Government

- a. Council Delegate Rickie Nez**—It's always good just to open the floor to talk to Dine. Thank you and congratulations on your position. Shirley, what if it's okay to have 20-30 heads of livestock in a corral. That can not graze anywhere. Help people have the desire to own livestock. Bring it up at your meetings.

B. Navajo Nation Code (NNC) Title 26: Navajo Nation Local Governance Act

- a. President Angelita A. Benally**—I've been in your seat for 15 years and now I'm up here. Lots of learning for me. Jan of 1982 was when this Chapter was established and the First Chapter President Stanley Benally Sr. I am the First Female Chapter President in history. Attended the FMS—May 29, 30 training at San Juan College. June 16-18 attended Supervisory training. Be patient with me.
- b. Vice-President Sophina A. Tyler**—I'm really happy that Agnie is in this position, we can start looking forward to operating. May was a pretty busy month for everybody. Been preparing for the Northern Agency Council since I'm an officer. We're having our upcoming meeting in 2 weeks, and have been collaborating with the other officers. Happy Fathers Day
- c. Secretary/Treasurer Deidra Cly-Ryals**—May 19-20 Training at Nenahnezad Chapter House for the National Incident Management System (NIMS). Run through Audit May 16, Auditors from Arizona. 25th Navajo Nation Council Public Hearing Thursday June 19 at 9am at Nenahnezad Chapter House, Federal Initiatives Aimed at Revitalizing the Coal Industry in the United States.
- d. Chapter Manager Dinah Paul**—Summer Youth - 5 Students are working here. 3 at Shiprock Workforce Development for the next 2 weeks. Wednesday the 18th is the CPR/1st Aide training. Class is paid for, free to registered voters @ 9am-3pm.

Arnold Dan—You guys got a lot of Flour left. What's your plans?

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—People come in those that haven't picked up.

Charlene Arviso—CPR, do we pay \$80 to restore it?

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—You pay \$2 when your certificate comes in.

President Angelita A. Benally—Could you explain CPR, cause some of these guys weren't here at the Planning Meeting? The CPR that's going to be here.

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—I already did in Navajo. Deidra you still have that flyer?

Chapter S/T Deidra Cly-Ryals—Yes, I'll go ahead and read it. The CPR will be conducted by ES Security Services LLC giving a 2 year certification with the National Safety Council. Workbooks are included. Hands on training with Adult & Child mannequin, EPI pens, AED trainer & demonstrations. June 18th at 9am at the San Juan Chapter.

Chereen Lopez—Is that a free service that is provided?

Chapter S/T Deidra Cly-Ryals—only for registered members. And if you have kids under the age 18 they are allowed.

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—ages 14-25. Do you want a copy?

Chereen Lopez—Is it on the website? In regards to the vacancy Admin Assistance. I know it's been open for several months. Why hasn't there been any successful candidate? I have a heavy background in HR. As a registered voter and community member I think it's important to select an individual that is highly qualified. What is the interview process and field process of selecting an individual and why is it taking so long for a candidate?

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—There are only 2 applicants. One didn't show up for the interview. The other one was selected because she was an AA previously. And she's working at another Chapter, she declined after she was offered the position. So far since then, we advertised again and no one applied. This just this past another one applied but the application came in late.

Chereen Lopez—I know the job market that may be difficult to get people to sign up. What I'm saying is that I'm willing to offer some of my services on a volunteer basis to attract some of those candidates, help the Chapter as far as trying to create a job description that is desirable.

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—Our ASC office does that. She does the screening of the applicants. I appreciate your help but I have to reach out to the ASC office.

Chereen Lopez—Okay. That's just something I put out there.

Vice-President Sophina A. Tyler—Since Chereen has offered. You could probably get her contact information, she probably could be on the interview panel for your next round of interviews.

Chapter Manager Dinah Paul—She could be.

Vice-President Sophina A. Tyler—Cause you need another member from the community to be part of the interview panel. She would be ideal.

Council Delegate Rickie Nez—Thank you Madam President. We used to have a resolution where the Community Members made a selection and that resolution read. One Chapter Official, One Chapter Administration and One Community member, the last one I believe was Jackie Begay. I don't know if it was ever utilized again, but if she's willing to do that. I think we can produce a resolution to appoint Ms. Lopez into that position from the community. Maybe a new resolution needs to be produced.

Chapter President Angelita A. Benally—That's what we're just saying, will do that.

C. Navajo Nation Code (NNC) Title 3: Agriculture and Livestock

- a. Farm Board Representative Herbert Cly**—How many farms are in here? Farming Meeting on the 18th at San Juan Chapter, I've been having my permittee meeting and only 5-7 farmers that showed up. 180 farm plots—I have a lot of questions and one of them is, Why are they not farming on their plot? (Community Member speaks out saying "No Tractors, No Waters") That's the problem but that can't be an excuse. You got to figure out a way. Buy one or ask your neighbor that has farm equipment. This is coming from the Navajo Nation Ag Department, their pushing it. I see the farm plots that gets planted every year, same ol' farmer. It looks nice, when I first became the farm board official that was my goal to bring these idle farms back to green. And that;s not happening. Water rights—only 25% of water here is being used. The permittee meeting is

going to be about farm plots (BIA). Extending beyond boundaries here without BIA knowledge. And the other one is this organization. Water users develop nonprofit organizations. It's like what Liz said, "no farm equipment". They were doing a lot of work in the Shiprock area and Hogback area. All these idle farms, people holidays auto that needs help. They're going around helping these people get these farms back to operational. What they suggest is you pay the Water assessment, going to be charged—\$200.00 to \$8000.00 high. I think because of that some are probate. I wanted to question Rickie Nez about this probate. We were supposed to get 6 probate judges, 4 years ago. We put in our resolution to get some help from a deceased family. Where are we at?

Council Delegate Rickie Nez—Madam President do you want me to respond now or after his report?

President Angelita A. Benally—Go ahead and respond.

Council Delegate Rickie Nez—Okay. No Farm equipment, there has to be a Plan of Operation that goes with it. It would be a challenge, Nenahnezad does it, I don't know how they do it but they set up that way. It needs probate, we recognized this 4-3 years ago, when the 24th Navajo Nation Council when I was in the Chair of the Resources and Development Committee. They need it probated. Grazing was the same way. Insurance carrier CKP, Agricultural Infrastructure. Mega drought, \$20 million, Agricultural related projects. Part of this Law, RDC put aside \$1 million for 5 probate judges for 5 agencies To focus on probate only. At the time we gave them a directive to the Department of Agriculture as well as the Judicial Branch. Judicial Branch, Dept of Ag, i don't know how much. Idle farms. We directed them to work together to find a solution, even advertise for these positions so they can fix it. Division of Natural Resources, reported a few months back this month for probate, even though it's somewhat unclear/vague. Where it is considered to be Ag Project—if it relates to Law and Judges doesn't have anything to do with Agriculture. So that money it's just there.

Farm Board Representative Herbert Cly—Thank you Rick. The reason why I brought up the Probate Judge, you know if you're going to have that LUP transferred into your name or to anybody's name. You would have to hire a lawyer. Some people can't afford one. When you tell them that, they forget it. Or they don't care. My suggestion would be to go to a Peace making court, settle there and see what happens. And go to the next step. We talked about it at our permittee meeting.

- b. Grazing Board Representative Shirley A. Tsosie**—Thank you. I know I served before but that's been over 20 years ago and I'm here again. Thank you. I want to thank the Community and Chapter Officials for allowing me to give my report to the community and the Chapter Administration for allowing me to give a report to the community. Last meeting we had our Agency grazing meeting at Cove Chapter. And our District Meeting at Nenahnezad just this last week. Our June District Grazing meeting was this past Wednesday on Homesite leases, spouse disputes, and grazing permits. Next meeting with District 13 is at Upper Fruitland on June 4 and the Northern Agency at Two Grey Hills/Toadlena on Thursday June 12. And the next San Juan Chapter Permittee is June 20-Friday. Last Grazing class on May 15, and I want to thank those that showed up and for your support. I have to help the permittees. I have to help them. Between them, BIA and the Natural Resources and the Department of Ag. Game, small game, asking about grounddogs. And this one too opinion of the Attorney General, I have to abide by this one too. Division of Natural Resources conservation plan, permittees have to make a conservation plan. That's not for me. I'm not telling you to do this, this is from BIA Natural Resources. Homesite lease, there are regulations. I have to work with people on this. And Navajo Rangelands improvement act 2014. In front of it, it says "Approved by the Secretary of Interior, April 25, 1956. Redesignating resource committee to enable Tribal Council. This is what I have to do. Assist. Please, Bosses. Farm Board Member, Vice President, Madam President, Madam Secretary, Madam Vice-President. When you contradict my job and you allow it, because it causes a lot of problems and causes

dispute. The idea that it's OK. So now I'm just crappy. It made it harder.

President Angelita A. Benally—As a Grazing member, we're trying to say that's my responsibility. This isn't here. Shirley, thank you for educating us. I just want to say that I am a grazing permit holder and. I attended every grazing permit meeting about 15 years ago and there are policies and procedures. I have to follow it. I know it's hard and then I'm starting to learn too. We always used to say K'e in the past. Then when I look to this day K'e got us in trouble. I'm a permit holder myself. I do the best I can to follow every policy procedure. I don't wanna break it because I signed that paper saying that I'm gonna follow the policies and procedure to be a permit holder. So, I have until the end of this month to get my tally count done. So if I don't get it done, she's gonna write me a thing saying that I'm non-compliant with my tally count. Being a chapter president, I'm starting to learn all of this. I'm starting to realize that because if I don't follow the FMS, I'm gonna get myself in trouble again. So that's why I'm starting to find out that even as a permit holder, I have to follow the policies, guidance and stuff like that too. So I just want to kind of point out that when you become an official or people become a representative we have to try to stay within those guidelines. So I just want to share that with you too. Thank you, Shirley.

George Arthur—My question is for the Farm Board and probably for the Council Delegate. Plan of Operation you asked to have that revised?

Farm Board Representative Herbert Cly—Yes, I've already done that.

George Arthur—My understanding, your colleague from Shiprock is putting together a new P.O.O. for the Farm Board. Will they have time to comment on it? Protocol is a 5 day comment period. Not everybody and myself don't have time to make the 5 days to what is being proposed. Next week or the following week at Nenahnezad, where your next meeting is?

Farm Board Representative Herbert Cly—Tuesday

George Arthur—I understand that's where it's going to be discussed and brought to the Community. This was going to take place, I understand the Farm Board didn't ask for it having the Plan of Operation revised. Who is the boss, Farm Board, Resources Committee, then Council. That's all I know. All of us need to take a look at what's being proposed? If you have a copy, I would like the paper. I don't know if our Delegate is aware of it. I know it's not the Resources Committee that is not proposing it. I just want a copy of it to review myself.

Council Delegate Rickie Nez—George, thank you for bringing that to our attention. When it does come before my Committee, I will ask for it to go back to the Farm Board to have a public hearing. Ah doo. Thank you, you are decision makers, you are here and I thank you for being here. My job as a law maker, we create laws, we amend laws and we appropriate money for programs among the Navajo Nation. Any law can be changed. If it affects our people, you ask yourself a question. Is this the best interest of the Navajo people? A public hearing is good, it brings out and collects information to base your decision. I will not ask you to break the law. We're humans, we break our own natural laws.

President Angelita A. Benally—Anyone here from the CLUP? Do you have a report? What have you guys been doing in your CLUP?

Charlene Arviso—Thank you for allowing me to do this. Right now we're trying to revise our policy since 2010. Looking for one more person to join us. Dinah is apparently not within the law, why she is stepping down. Lately we have been doing trash pick-up. One question I do have. 18th meeting—Faith flour. Sponsor meal to go towards CLUP-C. Make money off meals.

President Angelita A. Benally—We would have to take a look at your CLUP-C Plan of Operations. Thank you to CLUP-C for coming to present.
